REPORT ON THE JOHN E. GIBSON TRACT - NO. 12

- Location: This tract is a small lot near Smokemont on the public highway about one mile from Smokemont, which is the nearest railway point.
- Description: This tract was bought for a home for a working man to be handy on the Smokemont job. It is rough land, practically all cleared up and of only small value.
- Improvements: The house is a single story, two room box, without a chimney, and in poor condition. Shed near the house is of similar construction and same condition.
- Valuation: It is hard to justify the paying of a fair price for property of this kind. The owner paid \$200.00 for it; we suppose, with the idea of saving rent while working for the Champion Fibre Company at Smokemont. The tax valuation of this property is \$200.00, and considering the uses for which it has been put, is not excessive and the appraisers could hardly justify themselves in not paying \$200.00 for the property, considering the circumstances.

The tract contains 3 acres.
